More than ever before, I am proud of Planned Parenthood and happy to be working here. Amidst unprecedented challenges we are moving forward with energy, optimism, innovation and creativity. In my meetings with donors and funders and friends, I think people are surprised to find me in such positive spirits. The question on many faces is simply, why are you so upbeat?

I understand the question because, after all, this year has been filled with disappointing news for Planned Parenthood. We lost all family planning contract revenue with the State of Texas. That's right. Gone. All of it. And not coming back. The end. Additionally, Texas passed a new law controlling EXACTLY what physicians must say and do when providing abortion care, to include sonograms 24 hours in advance of the procedure and an ideological script for the physician that has no medical relevance. At these discussions, I have been describing our new sliding fee scale, our new high-complexity lab, and changes to our clinic locations. These changes are working and leading us forward, and that is certainly rewarding. But it's not all easy, or fun. We had to let go of our clinic in Alice because it is simply not sustainable without the state family planning contract. Sometimes difficult decisions are correct decisions, and so I ask you to understand these changes in very serious terms. Our detractors in the Legislature are trying to engineer the destruction of Planned Parenthood. Our survival, our very existence, is success.

What our detractors—in the Legislature or on the sidewalk—can't seem to figure out is that the future is ours because the fundamentals are with us. I've said it before and I'll say it again. People will continue to have sex. People will not want to become pregnant every time they have sex. Given

steps out of line, the penalties are immediate revocation of medical license and a \$10,000 fine. The recent injunction provides some hope (see article page 3) but this battle is not over. And if that wasn't enough, efforts are underway to exclude Planned Parenthood from the state's Medicaid Women's Health Program, which makes no sense because we are the state's largest provider of family planning within the program.

I am optimistic and energized because we are finding solutions and success that I believe will move Planned Parenthood beyond our current challenges and into a new era of sustainable operation. Many of you have attended one of the presentations and discussions entitled, **The Way Forward**, where I've been talking about innovation and transformation at Planned Parenthood. our modern day lifespan and fertility, family planning is an unequivocal good for the individual, the couple, and the family. And let's think about this globally: it is good for the planet. Nothing is going to stop people from wanting, indeed needing, the important contraceptive methods that allow women and men to plan their lives and create a better future for themselves and their children. This is not radical. This is not left-wing politics. I need you to help me assert these very reasonable ideas to everyone you know. And whenever someone speaks about family planning as "out of the mainstream" I want you to take them on, plain and simple. People need their birth control. In Her Own Words: A VERY DIFFICULT DECISION

Fully 94% of the people who visit our health centers seek preventive services such as Pap tests and birth control. Some women who visit Planned Parenthood have experienced an unintended pregnancy and we present her with information about all of her choices—continuing the pregnancy and becoming a parent, continuing the pregnancy and make a plan for adoption, and abortion care. We respect her decision regarding her pregnancy and should she need an abortion, we're here for her. The following letter from a patient who received abortion care is especially touching.

I made a very difficult decision to have a procedure done at Planned Parenthood this past Saturday. I just wanted to thank everyone for being so kind during a very stressful and emotional time for me. It truly was a relief that the staff at both the Babcock and Perrin-Beitel health centers were so wonderful. I was very nervous to attend my initial appointment at the Perrin-Beitel location, however, they were so sincere and really took the time to inform me of all my options and made sure I was alright. A woman held my hand during the entire procedure at the Babcock location and seemed so genuine. The doctor that performed the procedure and everyone I saw that day was so kind and seemed so sincere. Y'all are doing such a great thing for women like me. Thank you for everything.

This letter is a powerful reminder about the importance of **being a provider** of abortion care. We must ensure that women have moral agency over their bodies. We trust women. We have heard their stories. We know that women reach out to their families, their friends, the men in their lives, their faith, and then carefully make this decision. Some lawmakers do not trust women, and as a result of their efforts we are all watching as a legal challenge to the new Texas abortion law moves to the U.S. Fifth Circuit Court (see article page 3). This patient and her letter make it clear: this deeply personal decision about an unplanned pregnancy cannot be made by anyone other than the woman who is pregnant.

PRELIMINARY INJUNCTION PAUSES NEW TEXAS ABORTION LAW

On August 30, U.S. District Court Judge Sam Sparks, who was appointed to the bench by President George H.W. Bush in 1991, blocked key provisions of Texas' new mandatory sonogram law through a preliminary injunction. At the beginning of the legislative session, Governor Rick Perry had given the ultrasound bill emergency status. As such, the bill had moved swiftly through the legislative process to become the most intrusive abortion sonogram law in the country.

According to the law, a woman seeking an abortion must: submit to an ultrasound 24 hours prior to the procedure (or 2 hours if she lives 100 miles or more from an abortion provider). The physician who is to perform the abortion or a certified sonographer must display the ultrasound image to the woman, describe the dimensions and development of the fetus and make audible the fetal heart tone. For some women at earlier gestational ages, this would mean undergoing a vaginal probe sonogram (see probe below). Physicians would risk complete revocation of their medical license if they do not comply with any aspect of the requirements as defined by the law.

"The Act's onerous requirements will surely dissuade or prevent many competent doctors from performing abortions, making it significantly more difficult for pregnant women to obtain abortions," Sparks wrote in his order. "Forcing pregnant women to receive medical treatment from less-skilled providers certainly seems to be at odds with 'protecting the physical and psychological health and well-being of pregnant women,' one of the Act's stated purposes."

Further, Judge Sparks ruled that some of the law's requirements are likely both unconstitutionally vague and violate physicians' and women's First Amendment rights against compelled speech. "The act compels physicians to advance an ideological agenda with which they may not agree, regardless of any medical necessity, and irrespective of whether the pregnant women wish to listen," Sparks wrote.

Judge Sparks' preliminary injunction blocks the requirements to display the sonogram images to the patient, the verbal description of fetal development, and the requirement to make the heart tone audible. Sparks found that these requirements of the law likely violate First Amendment protections against state-mandated speech.

Judge Sparks let stand the requirement that an ultrasound be performed (by the physician or a certified sonographer) at least 24 hours prior to the procedure. In cases when a woman lives more than 100 miles from a provider, the 24-hour time period is shortened to two hours which was part of the law passed by the Legislature.

"We look at this ruling as a huge victory for women in Texas, and an important signal that the Legislature went too far when it passed this law," said Julie Rikelman, a lawyer with the New York-based Center for Reproductive Rights, which sought the injunction on behalf of Texas obstetriciangynecologists (*Austin-American Statesman*, August 30, 2011).

Just 30 minutes after Sparks issued partial injunctive relief on the ultrasound law, Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott appealed to the U.S. Fifth Circuit Court to block Sparks' order. Additionally, Abbott filed a request with the Fifth Circuit to stay Sparks' preliminary injunction. The Fifth Circuit denied the request. Next, Abbott made the same request of the U.S. Supreme Court where Justice Antonin Scalia handles these matters when they come from the Fifth Circuit. Justice Scalia also denied Abbott's request. Therefore, Sparks' preliminary injunction will remain in place until either he issues another order in the district court or the Fifth Circuit rules on Abbott's appeal.

However, given that Sparks let many of the law's provisions take effect, it is highly likely that some aspects of the original bill will remain law, making the provision of abortion more difficult in Texas. With generous emergency contributions from donors, Planned Parenthood is ready to continue abortion care service delivery regardless of the ultimate outcome of this case.

TEXAS CONTROL OF THE STATE OF

State Contracts and Medicaid Women's Health Program Take Big Hits

On Friday, August 26, Planned Parenthood received notice that the Department of State and Human Services (DSHS), a partner for more than three decades, would end its family planning contract with our health centers in

Brownsville, Harlingen, Alice and

Kingsville effective September 1, 2011. This devastating decision flows directly from the Texas Legislature whose budget eliminated two-thirds of all family planning funds.

These funding cuts take away birth control from 284,000 low-income Texas women, including Mari, who can no longer afford birth control. Medicaid costs due to unintended pregnancies will increase by more than \$231,000,000. The legislators who engineered this disaster and Governor Perry who signed this bill into law should be forced to answer one question: What are the plans for how taxpayers will face this explosion of Medical health care costs in Texas?

In addition to the drastic reductions, what little family planning funding that remains has been

 Mari, a patient at our health center in Brownsville. prioritized in a curious way so that Planned Parenthood and many other historic providers of family planning will be considered last when Texas determines where to send the money.

Despite these deep cuts to critical preventive care such as cervical cancer screenings and family planning, the 2011 budget found money to increase funding for anti-choice "crisis pregnancy centers" (CPCs), using some of the very same funds that had previously supported essential family planning services. CPCs offer no family planning to prevent unintended pregnancies and they have been known to spread misleading and inaccurate information about birth control, pregnancy, and abortion, and, in some instances, harass women over their choices.

After three decades as a family planning funder, why would the state end its family planning contract with Planned Parenthood? According to State Senator Jeff Wentworth (R-San Antonio), "The current opposition to family planning is not about birth control at all. It's about trying to end all legal abortions by not funding clinics that offer that service, even though abortion services are not paid for with tax dollars."

Throughout the Planned Parenthood Trust of South Texas, the health centers that received state family planning funds did not

provide abortion care. Further, since 2005, Planned Parenthood organizations inTexas (including the Planned Parenthood Trust) have separate subsidiaries to operate clinics that provide abortion care. This organizational

separation from state-funded family planning has been confirmed by independent auditors who were hired by the state at taxpayer expense. Compliance with full separation has never been disputed.

"My opinion is that some Republican senators oppose funding for family planning services because they mistakenly equate them with abortion services and fail to understand the range of women's health services offered at Planned Parenthood. Their funding cuts, which I opposed, reduced access to critical services that promote healthy pregnancies, including Pap tests, breast exams and diabetes screening." says State Senator Judith Zaffirini (D-Laredo). "Planned Parenthood programs at their best can reduce the number of abortions by helping women improve birth spacing and avoid unplanned pregnancies. Their positive outcomes include strengthening families and reducing the state's health costs."

Despite the damaging cuts to family planning in Texas, Planned Parenthood is poised to overcome this defunding by making strategic changes that will lead to a sustainable future. To some extent, we began these changes six years ago when the state cut our family planning contract by 38%. At that time we opened a new health center on Marbach Road with the generous sponsorship of Emilie and Brandon Chenault, to develop a clinic operating model that did not rely on the family planning contract. This clinic has been our laboratory of innovation where we have tried many new ideas.

We have learned a great deal at the Chenault Center, and that work has helped to develop the new sliding fee scale we piloted at four San Antonio locations in May of this year. While the new fee scale does not slide all the way to zero, it is still

very sensitive to one's ability to pay. It makes smart use of technology and relies on innovative approaches to our work, but it is fueled by the heroic philanthropy of donors. Sustainability is the buzz word going forward at Planned Parenthood. Everything must be sustainable and much less vulnerable to vagaries of politics and public policy. Consequently, our careful analysis and planning have identified clinics that are not sustainable. Sadly, our health center in Alice had

to be closed. The small population and relatively low client volume made the site unsustainable without the family planning contract funds. Additionally, in Brownsville, one small

volume health center and one medium volume health center have been consolidated into one larger volume site. These decisions are not easy, but they are correct—and they will help our patient Mari, and other women like her, afford birth control.

In 1969, then-Congressman George H.W. Bush, while championing the Public Health Service Act (Title X) on House floor, told his colleagues, "We need to make population and family planning household words. We need to take sensationalism out of this topic so that it can no longer be used by militants who have no real knowledge of the voluntary nature of the program but, rather, are using it as a political steppingstone. If family planning is anything, it is a public health matter."

These words ring just as true today.

WOMEN'S HEALTH PROGRAM

Without state family planning contract support, family planning reimbursements from the Medicaid Women's Health Program of Texas (WHP) have become more important than ever. WHP is an expansion of Medicaid family planning coverage for women with household incomes at or below 185% of the federal poverty level. WHP covers essential preventive health care including well-woman exams where women receive Pap tests and clinical breast exams, contraception, and screening for diabetes and high blood pressure.

As the single largest provider within the Women's Health Program, Planned Parenthood health centers have been critical to the success of WHP. Forty percent of all women helped by WHP statewide receive their care at a Planned

Parenthood health center. In a single year, Planned Parenthood's participation in the Medicaid WHP helped more than 4,000 women avoid an unplanned pregnancy, saving taxpayers over

\$46 million in Medicaid-covered births.

WHP began in January 2007 as a five year pilot project and is set to expire on December 31, 2011. During the 2011 legislative session, the Legislative Budget Board recommended renewal and expansion of WHP, but members of the House and Senate and advocacy groups who oppose abortion care hijacked the debate over WHP. These same lawmakers on the House Public Health and Senate Health and Human Services Committees froze all efforts to renew WHP while they developed language that would eliminate Planned Parenthood from the program. Ultimately, language was placed in the state budget bill and in the Medicaid Overhaul bill that, when taken together, will continue WHP for two years but would do so in a way that excludes Planned Parenthood statewide. The excluding language directs that no WHP funds may go to "entities that perform or promote elective abortions or affiliate with entities that perform or promote elective abortions."

Following the instructions of the Legislature, the Texas Health and Human Services Commission has defined the term "affiliate" and will soon notify Planned Parenthood organizations that they may no longer submit reimbursements for family planning to WHP. At that point, Planned Parenthood will file a legal challenge to this exclusion.

ABOUT HABLA CON TU HERMANA

Since 1996, Habla Con Tu Hermana (Talk To Your Sister) has been providing health education to women in our communities. Volunteer community health workers, most of whom are bilingual, provide this education via presentations in homes. community organizations and local businesses.

In 2010, the Habla Con Tu Hermana program expanded to the Lower Rio Grande Valley, providing health education to 12,266 people from San Antonio to Brownsville.

HABLA CON TU HERMANASM A PROGRAM UPDATE

Patient Navigation Yielding Great Results

At the beginning of the year, Habla Con Tu Hermana increased its focus on tracking patient navigation. "We know that women who come to an Habla Con Tu Hermana presentation are better informed about the need for an annual exam and learn about family planning," says Sandy Doughton, Vice President for Health Promotion. "We wanted to take this a step further and track our participants to see how many of them visited a Planned Parenthood health center after receiving health education."

Of the 609 patient referrals provided by Habla Con Tu Hermana this year, 190 women have become patients. "This is a great starting point, but we'd like to navigate more patients," says Doughton. "Some women don't visit the health centers right away. We're working to continuously follow-up, track appointments, and make sure they receive the health care services they need."

Southeast Expansion Project

Habla Con Tu Hermana has expanded its outreach in San Antonio to include three new zip codes: 78210, 78202 and 78203. Public health statistics for these communities, located in the near Southeast side of San Antonio, indicate a great need for family planning and reproductive health care. The 78210 zip code in particular has been identified by San Antonio Metro Health as a high risk area for ongoing health problems, including high Medicaid births and too-soon pregnancy. Valerie Andrade, Habla Con Tu Hermana staff, and two of our promotoras, Isela Ortegon and Nancy Jafari, have been meeting with community stakeholders over the past several months.

According to Andrade, "The Southeast Side is a greatly underserved community. Many women don't know about all the preventive services at Planned Parenthood like Pap tests, clinical breast exams, birth control, STD testing and treatment. We're working with community organizations and their leaders so they know Planned Parenthood is a safe place women can rely on to get the health care they need." Ortegon and Jafari have made education presentations to women in homes, community centers and local businesses including: Las Palmas Bakery, Eyemart Express and Cricket.


