Contraception Recommendation for Teens

ate last year, the New England Journal of Medicine released results of a new study on the use of long-acting, reversible contraception (LARC) methods among women aged 15 to 19 years old. The study provided these women with accurate information about all their birth control options, including LARC methods like the intrauterine device (IUD) and implant, and supplied them with the method of their choice at no cost. Implants are match stick sized devices inserted under a woman's skin that release a hormone that prevents pregnancy and are marketed under the names Implanon and Nexplanon.

Of the 1,400 teenage girls and women who participated, 72 percent chose an IUD or implant. The study found that participants had rates of pregnancy, birth, and abortion that were much lower than the national rates for sexually experienced teens.

This study prompted the American Academy of Pediatrics to update its contraception policy, recommending that IUDs and implants be the first-line birth control method for adolescents.

PPHP offers the full range of contraceptive options – including

the IUD and the implant – and complete information to help a woman make an informed decision about which method is best for her, according to Medical Director Vanita Kumar, MD.

"This study helps raise awareness about the safety and efficacy of IUDs and implants, which are a great option as they have a less than 1 percent failure rate," Dr. Kumar said. "PPHP wants all young people to have the information and resources they need to prevent unintended pregnancy, meet their life goals, and start their families when the time is right for them."



Teens Promote Smart Choices Through Social Media

eens have always looked to their peers for information and advice on sexual health and the information hasn't always been reliable. So, more than a dozen teens participating in Planned Parenthood Hudson Peconic's (PPHP) Comprehensive Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention (CAPP) Program, have produced three public service announcements for their peers. The PSAs focus on healthy relationships, the importance of using condoms, and a virtual visit to a PPHP health center for reproductive medical care.

The "virtual center tour" PSA entitled *No Matter What Your Drama*, the newest in the series, was filmed at PPHP's New Rochelle Health Center. The nearly seven minute video, which can be viewed at www.pphp.org, walks teens through the process of a health center visit from check-in through a consultation, and includes different scenarios.

In late 2014, as part of the project, teens worked with social media company MyMediaLife to learn how to use new media to deliver a message to other teens about sexual health. As a result the teens were tasked with creating and posting positive messages for Twitter, Instagram, Tumblr, Vine, and Facebook that include a link to the video. Their progress will be measured to see how effectively the news is spread and how widely the videos are viewed.

"These PSAs are more than just a fun project," Mary Grace Pagaduan, PPHP CAPP Manager, said. "They give young people an opportunity to take an active role in encouraging thousands of teens to make smart

choices, and demystify the health center experience. At the same time, through CAPP, they learn professional skills and a positive use of social media."

The CAPP Program is a five-year project made possible through funding from the New York State Department of Health.

hile PPHP's new Medical Director Vanita Kumar, MD has been a per diem provider at PPHP for the past ten years, her work with Planned Parenthood started when she was a receptionist for Planned Parenthood Southwest Ohio Region in Dayton during college. Her interest in women's health and reproductive rights motivated her to start the first Medical Students for Choice chapter at The George Washington University School of Medicine during medical school.

Today, Dr. Kumar also holds the position of Family Medicine Physician at Montefiore Medical Center and is an Associate Professor for Family Medicine at the Albert Einstein College of Medicine. At Albert Einstein College of Medicine, she was the primary trainer for residents in family medicine and worked to expand the abortion provider pool by bringing residents to Planned Parenthood of New York City for training. Dr. Kumar has continued this practice by training Institute for Urban Family Health Reproductive Health fellows at the PPHP New Rochelle health center.

"I am looking forward to helping PPHP expand its exceptional health services, and have particular interest in increasing patients' access to long-acting, reversible contraception (LARC) methods," Dr. Kumar said.



Dr. Kumar received her medical degree at The George Washington University School of Medicine. She completed a Family Medicine residency at Beth Israel Medical Center and a Faculty Development fellowship at the Albert Einstein College of Medicine.
