The Experience

NYU Ob/Gyn Residents have the opportunity to participate in the Global Women's Health Elective at Korle Bu Teaching Hospital during their chief year of residency. Residents learn principles of global health through global health lectures during the first two years of residency. Residents who have completed these lectures are eligible for the elective. Rotations can be 2-4 weeks. Residents are placed on KBTH resident teams and participate on clinical services with those teams.

Below are some of the aspects included in the Global Women's Health Elective

- Clinical services: Labor & Delivery, Gynecologic Surgery, Reproductive Health/Family Planning
- Optional experiences: Sickle Cell Clinic, Diabetes Clinic

So it is official I have finished a 24 hour shift here at Korle-Bu Hospital and it was pretty tough. I worked on the maternity ward #1 (there are 6 OMG!) and did vaginal deliveries and c-sections throughout the night. Just to give you an idea of how busy the hospital is, they do 11,000 deliveries per year (Bellevue and Tisch combined do about 9,000) so some serious babies happening here. I did 2 c-sections Along the way I offered some surgical skills tips... I also helped out with a breech vaginal delivery that took like 20 minutes to deliver the baby (Iwas freaking out... way too long to get that kid out) and then I bagged and resuscitated it prior to transferring it to the NICU. He had a heartbeat and was breathing by the time it went up so I hope he does ok.
