M.D.: Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai

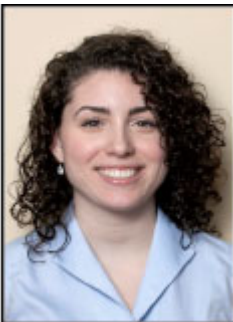
