Should med students be required to watch an abortion?

My first day of Obstetrics/Gynecology was as amazing as I hoped it would be. If the o**lffe**r 30 days of the rotation are just as thrilling, I think I've found myself a specialty! As much as I think I'm going to like it, I have heard OB/GYN is one of the harder blocks because of the long hours and many requirements.

During orientation, we received a giant packet of assignments for the next five weeks, one of which is a checklist of about fifty different procedures, operations, or diagnoses we are required to see in OB/GYN. Not to mention, the same procedure is done under circumstances other than the voluntary termination of a pregnancy, such as during a miscarriage. There are so many other requirements for OB/GYN, I can't believe this one isn't on that exhaustive list.
