Think the glass ceiling's shattered? Not in medicine

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Men make 41% more than women across all medical specialties, and 21% more in Primary Care. From medscape.com.

Medscape just published **a study** of almost 16,000 physicians across the country, gathering data on demographics, specialties, and compensation. Not a whole lot of the findings surprised me – I could have told you that Orthopedic Surgeons and Radiologists make the most bank. I also had a feeling male doctors still make more than women. But I *was* surprised to find out just how *huge* the salary disparity is between men and women physicians in 2011.

Across all specialties, men are making a median of \$225,000 per year, while women are making \$160,000. That means men are making a whopping 41% more. Or to look at the numbers a different way, it will take a female doc a year and five months to earn the salary men make in a year.
