## Judge blocks Arkansas order banning elective abortions during pandemic

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LITTLE ROCK (AP & KATV) — A federal judge on Tuesday blocked Arkansas' order preventing the state's only surgical abortion clinic from performing the procedure during the coronavirus pandemic.

The decision came as health officials announced that at least 1,498 people in the state have been infected with the coronavirus, an increase over the 1,410 reported a day earlier. Two more people died because of the virus, bringing the state's death toll to 32.

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abortions unless they're needed to protect the life or health of the mother.

"The limited record supports the ... allegation that enforcement of the (order) against LRFP will inflict serious physical, emotional, and psychological injuries on LRFP's patients by forcing them to delay, or altogether forgo, access to abortion care," Baker wrote.

The state accused the clinic of violating its order preventing elective surgeries that could be safely postponed. Other states have used similar orders to restrict abortions during the public health crisis.

"The state's action had nothing to do with public health, and everything to do with politicians using the pandemic as an excuse to violate the constitution and further their extreme agenda," said Holly Dickson, interim executive director of the American Civil Liberties Union of Arkansas, which represented the clinic.

The clinic said 20 patients, who were not candidates for abortion-inducing medication, were scheduled for surgical abortions this week, saying that ban endangers the lives of patients because they may leave the state to seek an abortion elsewhere.

The American Civil Liberties Union filed the suit in federal court Monday on the clinic's behalf.

Clinical director of the clinic Lori Williams released this statement after the ruling was announced on Tuesday:

"As health care professionals, the health and safety of our patients is our foremost concern, and we are committed to doing everything we can to protect them, our staff, and our community while providing access to essential health care," said Lori Williams, clinical director at Little Rock Family Planning Services. "Even during a pandemic, pregnant people require health care — whether it is abortion care or prenatal care and childbirth services — and that care cannot be delayed until after the crisis is over."

Senior staff attorney Ruth Harlow of the ACLU Reproductive Freedom Project released this statement:

"As leading medical experts have recognized, Arkansas' and other states' attempts to prevent patients from accessing abortion care does nothing to protect people from the virus. It just stops people from getting essential care and forces them to continue their pregnancies against their will, which requires substantially more health care resources."

Family Council President Jerry Cox spoke with KATV after the decision, saying he believes this is a bad ruling and goes against standards for public health during the pandemic.

"They had people parking in the overflow parking, and there were a lot of people coming and going over there at the facility," he said. "That's just one example. If people gather in relatively large numbers inside a small building, I think most people here in Arkansas would say that's a problem, that's a health hazard." said Cox.

Many Arkansas officials reacted to the judge's decision Tuesday.

The attorney general's office said she would take "immediate steps" to have the ruling reversed.

"Attorney General Rutledge is extremely disappointed in today's decision to blatantly disregard good public health guidelines and temporarily halt the Health Department's directive without allowing the State to be heard," spokeswoman Amanda Priest said.

Lt Gov. Tim Griffin released the following statement:

"This ruling is wrong and undermines the public health and safety of Arkansans by allowing abortion clinics to openly flout Governor Hutchinson's directive regarding elective surgeries while thousands of other medical professionals are complying with the directive. I am pro-life, but abortion rights advocates describe the decision to abort as a 'choice.' That, by definition, means even they believe abortion procedures are elective."

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
