Founded collaboratively in 2003 by UCSF's ANSIRH (Advancing New Standards in Reproductive Health) Program and two Planned Parenthood affiliates, TEACH has provided training and networking for a number of Northern California Family Medicine residencies, as well as innovative curricula for primary care providers.
